The League of Women Voters has a wonderful voting resource tool - https://www.vote411.org. Just enter your address to find out what offices you will be voting for, who the candidates are for each office, their biographical information, and if they have answered the questions given to all candidates by the LWV, those answers are also there. Additionally, you can access videos of candidate forums that were sponsored by the LWV. This is a wonderful resource for those offices that you don't hear much about.

Tech Trek 2022 – Florida Virtual STEM Summer Camp for rising 8th graders

The 2022 Tech Trek Camp was held virtually during the second week of June.

Girls who were nominated by one of their math or science teachers completed applications and were interviewed virtually by AAUW members who lived near them. Following this process 60 girls who will enter 8th grade in the fall were invited to attend the camp. The girls selected one core course of 10 or 12 hours and 4 1-1/2 hour workshops to attend during camp. The core courses were: Computer Science Discoveries, Qualcomm Wearable Tech, Climate Change, Structural Engineering and Neuroscience. The workshops were Social Media, Everglades and Climate Change, DNA, My Place in Space, Digital Environment, Chemistry, Fitness, Flip Grid, Bullet Journal, and Rube Goldberg. They ranked their core and workshop choices from one to four.

National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL)

Three students from New College attended **NCCWSL**, a three-day leadership training, inspiration and networking conference held virtually in May. Our Sarasota branch paid for their registration. The theme for the 2022 conference was: "New Year. New Learning. New Connections." Following is a report from student Isabelle Campesi who details her NCCWSL experience. She references a new workshop on "Design Thinking" that was a special half-day session.

My Experience with the NCCWSL conference this year has been amazing. This was my first NCCWSL conference and I was amazed by what I learned throughout the conference. Each of the conference speakers were inspiring and I was grateful that they all took time out of their day to speak about a topic that they were passionate about. Even though the conference was virtual, the support that many of the students attending the conference and the speakers had for each other was something that I have never seen before, even in person. As someone who has many different interests within academics, I have always heard that I can only do one thing, and one thing only. The conference this year has helped me realize that many of my interests can intersect with one another and even lead to a new career.

The Design Thinking Workshop was eye opening as it taught me the skills necessary to think outside of the box and put my plans in action. Being able to interact with other attendees and see how they plan to put their goals into action helped see other strategies that I could use. One of the panels that stood out to me was the Women and Confidence Workshop. As someone who has struggled with their own self-confidence, the most important thing that I have learned from this panel is that gaining confidence can be done through collaboration and having close connections. Another panel that stood out to me was Entrepreneurship, Social Media Influencers, and Big Business Panel. Growing up surrounded by social media, this panel made me think about all of the different ways social media can be used to educate people on a topic that I am passionate about and create a positive impact in my community. The final panel that really stood out to me was the Finding the Right Career for You Panel. This panel combined so many things that I learned from previous panels I attended, including using confidence when applying for a job. From what I learned from this panel, reflection was one of the biggest themes, and reflecting from what you want out of a career, not only helps identify what you are passionate about, but also what you want to see change.

Overall, my experience at the **NCCWSL** conference this year was great. I hope more people are able to receive the same opportunity as me to attend this conference and be able to learn and connect with other people who are passionate about their own interests.
